


MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT & CEO



There are few businesses or organizations that are charged with, or prepared for, serving Everyone, Everywhere - the theme for this year's annual report. Most have narrower, segmented markets in which to target and serve. In addition, there are few issues that affect Everyone, Everywhere without regard to age, race, socioeconomic status, lifestyle, family structure, etc. Mental health is just that, crossing all sectors and impacting us all.

Hamilton Center is keenly aware of the challenge and immense responsibility of offering a service delivery system that can effectively respond to our diverse communities. Provider shortages, scarce resources, providing the depth and breadth of services needed to serve such diverse populations, and continuous change can be difficult to navigate. I am extremely proud of our staff for working through these challenges to prepare us for the transformation that is now occurring in behavioral health substance abuse services and overall healthcare service delivery systems.

Hamilton Center is grateful to be an inaugural partner, chosen by the State of Indiana, to transition to a federal Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC), which you will read more about in this report. For several years, our organization has been a part of this initiative through federal grants. However, we now have the opportunity to transition to a sustainable system. ensuring a long vision. One of the characteristics of this new model is to ensure "no wrong door" or, in other words, assisting people with seamless access to care, meeting them where they are, and serving them regardless of ability to pay. There also is an emphasis on crisis services, again meeting people where they are by developing mobile crisis teams and integrating with the new 988 national crisis line. These and several other important components of the model will be a process to implement, but I'm confident in our ability to meet the challenge in what is the largest transformation this industry has seen in years. I'm energized at what lies ahead for our State.

I want to thank the community, in particular the many strong partners that support our mission and have helped position us for this new endeavor. Working together, we move into this next decade with renewed optimism of the immense possibilities CCBHCs can provide for our State and Everyone, Everywhere, who is counting on our services each day.

FISCAL YEAR HIGHLIGHTS

Secured The Joint Commission's Gold Seal of Approval® for Behavioral Health and Addiction Accreditation for WIN Recovery Knox and Hendricks counties. Hamilton Center's opioid treatment program. This accreditation demonstrates continuous compliance with performance standards and quality that reflects Hamilton Center's commitment to providing safe and quality patient care.

Received a \$1 million continuation grant from The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) to continue work on Hamilton Center's transition in becoming a Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic.

Received a \$422.424 Community Crisis
Response Partnership grant from the Indiana
Family and Social Services Administration –
Division of Mental Health and Addiction, which
will be used to further Hamilton Center's ability
to respond to crises 24 hours a day, seven days
a week in Sullivan County.

Awarded a \$4.462.483 Crisis Receiving and Stabilization Services contract from the Indiana Family and Social Services Administration– Division of Mental Health and Addiction to add a crisis stabilization unit in Vigo County and launch a new mobile crisis hub in Sullivan County.

Trained close to 200 people in Mental Health First Aid and Youth Mental Health First Aid including employees with THRIVE. Sullivan Public Libraries. Sullivan County Community Hospital, various central and west-central Indiana school corporations. Mental Health America, several addiction recovery centers and several EMTs in the area.


Offered support to 60 individuals over four crisis response events, providing 58 hours of in-kind crisis services to the community.

Provided a total of 147 hours of in-kind services to Southwest Parke School Corporation and North Central Parke School Corporation.

Secured a new partnership with L.O.S.S. (Local Outreach to Suicide Survivors) Team. This is a team housed with Mental Health America (MHA) and provides support to those affected by suicide.

Awarded up to \$666,768 from the State of Indiana's Family and Social Services Administration (FSSA) for the purpose of major repairs and maintenance to existing group homes.



CCBHC IS HERE!

Hamilton Center is one of eight Community Mental Health Centers to be selected for Indiana's Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) Medicaid demonstration pilot.

Hamilton Center Inc. has been selected by the State of Indiana to help lead the charge in the transformation of community mental health. The organization's selection in the Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC) demonstration marks a significant milestone in the ongoing effort to enhance mental health and substance use disorder services across the state. This designation will allow Hamilton Center and the State of Indiana to reimagine how healthcare services are delivered, better integrating behavioral and primary healthcare.

The CCBHC Medicaid Demonstration Program provides states with sustainable funding that will help expand access to mental health and substance use services, supporting the national efforts to tackle the country's mental health and addiction crises and transform the county's behavioral heath system. Indiana Congressman Larry Bucshon is co-sponsoring a bill, Ensuring Excellence in Mental Health Act.

which will be critical in establishing the infrastructure needed to achieve a long-term vision of the CCBHC model.

Key components of the CCBHC model include:

- · 24/7/365 Access to Crisis Services.
- Comprehensive Outpatient Mental Health and Substance Use Services.
- Care Coordination: Integrating primary care and behavioral health services.
- Quality and Accountability: Adopting evidence-based practices and continuously monitoring outcome.

In addition, the CCBHC initiative is also expected to reduce non-emergent emergency room visits, divert individuals from incarceration to treatment, increase access to medication assisted treatment and invest in the healthcare workforce in our communities.

Hamilton Center has been preparing for several years to position itself to respond to this new healthcare model.
